New Clinical Decision Unit for medical observation opens on 3 East

A new medical observation unit has opened at Mather with the goal of moving patients out of the Emergency Department (ED) more quickly and into a more comfortable setting where decisions can be made as to whether they are admitted to the hospital or discharged. The Clinical Decision Unit (CDU) consists of six beds in three rooms on 3 East. Patients are managed by 3 East nurses and nursing assistants and by the ED physician assistants.

"The goal of the unit is to place patients who are awaiting to see if they are going to be admitted or discharged in this special unit and not in the ED. The goal is to have all testing completed and make a determination in less than 20 hours," said AVP for Nursing Emergency Services & Critical Care Phillip Messina, BSN, MPH, RN, who added that Mather has been doing observation in the ED for a few years, but that consisted of beds scattered throughout the department. hospitals has shown that CDUs result in fewer patient readmissions, decreased length of stay, better patient satisfaction scores and decreased crowding in Emergency Departments.

"It's also about the patient experience," said Senior Director of Patient Access Kelly Mullane. "Instead of a patient being placed in the Emergency Room for an extended period of time, patients that meet the criteria are now placed in the CDU, which is a more appropriate setting. The CDU was also structured to maintain the community hospital 'feel', which our patients expect when they're treated at Mather."

Mullane said that patient education about this new unit is extremely important. "You're leaving the Emergency Room and being placed on an inpatient unit, but you're telling the patient they're an outpatient," she said. "The outpatient concept is extremely confusing to our CDU patients, so the Patient Access staff makes sure that each patient understands where they are and why."

ED Nurse Manager Julie Tegay, RN, said data from other

They include: **MAST-B** (Mather Administrative Safety Team Brief) - Each morning, Mather leaders gather at 8:30 am for what is known as the MAST-B. This daily, safety oriented meeting increases awareness and communication among frontline staff and discusses current safety challenges and issues, their solutions, and the priorities for the day.

TeamSTEPPS® (Team Strategies and Tools to Enhance Performance and Patient Safety) is an evidence-based set of tools aimed at improving patient outcomes by enhancing communication and teamwork skills among healthcare professionals. The core of TeamSTEPPS® is leadership, situation monitoring, mutual support, and communication. Approximately 130 Mather staff members were trained as master TeamSTEPPS trainers. By the end of 2019, every Mather staff member will take one of two classes – a Fundamentals Class for direct care staff or an Essentials Class for support departments.

These organization-wide efforts will aid us in providing even higher levels of patient safety and quality of care. We are striving for an even higher star rating from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services.

The core of TeamSTEPPS[®] is comprised of four skills: Leadership, Situation Monitoring, Mutual Support, and Communication. Annuities can be created with a minimum gift of \$10,000 and can be for one or two lives, so a couple also can benefit from this type of gift. If you are age 60 or older, you may set up an annuity and begin to receive immediate payments. You may also create a deferred annuity if you are between the ages of 50-59. Authentic nurse leadership article by CNO vice president for nursing Marie Mulligan to be published

"Authentic Nurse Leadership Conceptual Framework: Nurses' perception of authentic leader attributes," by CNO/ VP for Nursing Marie Mulligan, PhD, RN, CNOR, NEA-BC and Sarah Eckardt, MS, will be published in Nursing Administration Quarterly "Finding an Antidote to toxic Leadership" April /June Edition. This publication was a finding from Dr. Mulligan's research and doctoral dissertation.

"My professional focus has been on healthcare and leadership," Mulligan said. "Therefore, the focus of my PhD studies and research was in the development of a leadership framework for nursing and health care professionals. The research and completion of the dissertation was complex in nature and took three years to complete. I am very pleased and honored to have my work recognized in a scholarly publication. The dissemination of my research findings has significant implications for nursing practice and leadership especially in health care today."

"Today's nurse leaders are challenged to successfully implement and sustain healthy work environments and promote staff engagement," the article's introduction states. "Authentic leaders possess inner core values that are consistent with the nursing profession. Authentic nurse leaders are able to create a healthy work environment that leads to engaged nurses."

Daily leader brief promotes safety and quality of care at Mather

Each morning, Mather's leadership gathers for what is known as MAST (Mather Administrative Safety Team) Brief. This meeting is a way of keeping everyone aware of frontline operations, identifying problems, assigning people to resolve issues and ensuring that everyone knows the priorities for the day.

The huddle is a review of the past 24 hours, a look ahead at potential issues that could arise at the Hospital and an opportunity to report on safety issues previously identified and what is being done to resolve them.

"By meeting each morning we can share information on safety issues and react more quickly to resolve them," said Mather President Kenneth Roberts. "Patient safety is a top priority at Mather and this is another tool to help ensure we are providing the best care possible to our patients."


Veterans Field of Honor ceremony

Improving patient care: New privacy curtains help reduce hospital acquired infections

Anti-microbial privacy curtains that can be easily cleaned have been installed at Mather Hospital as part of an effort to reduce hospital-acquired illnesses.

"According to the Centers for Disease Control, 205 people die each day due to hospital acquired infections. There is mounting recognition that hospital environments play a pivotal role in the spread of healthcare associated infections," said Joanne Lauten, MSN, SCRN, CPHQ, Director of Quality and Stroke Coordinator.

Privacy curtains in hospital rooms can collect dangerous antibiotic-resistant bacteria. VRE (Vancomycin-Resistant Enterococcus) can survive on polyester for up to 80 days and MRSA (Methicillin- Resistant Staphylococcus Aureus) up to 40 days. Privacy curtains are difficult to disinfect, clean and can be difficult to change. In a recent study it was determined that because pathogens can stay on hospital surfaces for weeks, curtains are a vehicle for transmission.

Hand shield anti-microbial curtains were developed by healthcare professionals to aide in preventing the spread of infection. Having a permanently affixed shield, allows for the curtain to be wiped frequently, decreasing the spread of multi-drug resistant organisms.

The curtains, which were installed in late November, were funded in part by a \$225,000 donation from the Mather Auxiliary. "Mather is continually striving to improve patient care by decreasing the risk of infection to our patients. These new anti-microbial curtains will promote a cleaner, safer patient environment and will add to the ongoing initiatives taken by the hospital to prevent the spread of infection," Lauten said. "Other hospitals in the Northwell system that have introduced these new curtains have seen a tremendous decrease in hospital acquired C- difficile, MRSA and VRE.

Congratulations to the MRI Center for once again being awarded ACR accreditation for Breast MRI.


Innovation & Growth

This year we will be adding two new CT scanners, a 128-slice CT and a 64-slice CT. We will be retiring the 16 slice CT scanner that has served us for more than a decade.

This will help with providing better patient experience and quality care by reducing the waiting time for CT scans.

In addition, we will be adding **intraoperative CT** technology for neurosurgery in our Operating Suite. Called Airo, this technology provides CT images of the patient's anatomy while they are in the operating room, allowing our surgeons to make more accurate intraoperative decisions rapidly. This helps to save time and, when combined with our image guided surgery system, enables greater surgical accuracy.

Every second counts in an emergency. That's why, prior to receiving our Cardiac Catheterization approval, we are planning to recommission our heliport so that we can accommodate SkyHealth, Northwell Health's state-of-the-art emergency helicopter service that greatly reduces the time to transport a critically ill or injured patient. Flying over traffic at 135 miles an hour, the SkyHealth helicopter offers the fastest and safest route to advanced care. Thank you again to the Mather Auxiliary for helping to fund this project.
