Patients with cancerous and non-cancerous tumors anywhere in the body, including the prostate, lung, brain, spine, liver, pancreas and kidney, have a non-invasive treatment option that offers submillimeter accuracy. Called Precision CyberKnife of New York, the new program is a joint effort of Mather Hospital and North Shore Hematology Oncology Associates (NSHOA).

"It is not unusual during a Precision CyberKnife procedure to have more than 100 beams of high dose radiation converging on a tumor from multiple directions," said Martin Silverstein, MD, radiation oncologist.

Precision CyberKnife

focuses those beams with extreme accuracy to the tumor, while avoiding healthy organs and tissue that is close by. It adjusts for even the most subtle motion made by the patient during the treatment.

"As the tumor moves with a patient's respiration, Precision CyberKnife actually follows the movement of that tumor during the respiratory cycle," Dr. Silverstein said. "No other radiation system can do this during the course of the radiation therapy treatment."

"I've been a practicing radiation oncologist for more than 25 years. I've seen great advances in radiation technology. Precision CyberKnife is

one of the most amazing breakthroughs in radiation delivery that I've seen in my career," said Dr. Silverstein. "It's truly amazing. It's science fiction that's here today."

Radiation oncologist Joseph Cirrone, MD, said, "With Precision CyberKnife patients typically have one to five treatments over the course of a week as compared to conventional radiation treatments that can take 5-9 weeks. During treatment, the patient experiences no discomfort or pain."

The partnership between NSHOA and Mather combines the expertise of the radiation oncologists at NSHOA with that of interventional radiologists, pulmonologists, neurosurgeons and other medical experts at Mather Hospital. The Precision CyberKnife team keeps the patient's referring doctor informed during treatment.

"We're ecstatic to bring this new modality of treatment to patients and offer them the latest and best care possible," Cirrone said.

Precision CyberKnife FAQs

Is this a new treatment?

Precision Cyberknife uses the same solid principals of radiation that have been in practice for many years, but delivers that radiation in an extremely well defined manner. The physicist/ dosemetrist works with the physician to maximize the dose of radiation to the treatment area, while minimizing the impact on healthy tissue.



What does it treat?

Precision CyberKnife can treat cancerous and noncancerous tumors in the brain, spine, lung, prostate and abdomen. Consult with your physician about your options and whether this treatment is an option.

What if I can't stay still?

The technology behind Precision CyberKnife is so advanced and so precise that it can detect motion, even the slightest shallow breath. As you move when you breathe, so too does the tumor, but the technology is able to track that movement and maintain the precision.

How will I feel during and after?

Treatment with Precision CyberKnife is pain-free, non-invasive and requires no anesthesia. Most patients experience no or little side effects and can return immediately to their normal activity.

Will my doctor still be involved?

Precision CyberKnife of New York works closely with referring physicians, such as community-based medical oncologists, pulmonologists, neurosurgeons and interventional radiologists. While you are receiving treatment, we are in touch with your referring doctor. After treatment, you will be referred back to your doctor for any additional care.

5 Things To Consider Before Having a Hip Replacement

ctivity, aging and arthritis are some of the reasons that more and more people are receiving total hip replacements each year. The American Association of Hip and Knee Surgeons projects 500,000 hip replacement procedures in the U.S. annually by the year 2030, nearly double the number performed today.

If you are contemplating hip surgery, consider the following:

1. Is it the right time?

The first step to a hip replacement is determining that you need it. Is your pain keeping you up at night and preventing you from going about your daily life? Have you tried other options like therapy or medication but saw no lasting relief? Are you in general good health? If you answered yes to these questions, it may be time.

2. Get more than one physician opinion.

First speak with your primary care provider and then seek out at least two opinions from qualified orthopedic surgeons. This will give you more information and help you to make the best decision for your health.

3. Anterior or Posterior?

Hip replacement surgery can be performed from the front of the hip (anterior) or the rear (posterior) depending on the patient and the patient's condition. There are advantages to both procedures. For example, anterior surgery may require a smaller incision than posterior and have less chance of dislocation, but has some additional risks. Conversely, posterior may be the better option for patients with osteoporosis because it generally has a lower risk of fracture. Talk with your surgeon about how your procedure will be performed.

4. Making lifestyle changes before surgery.

Smoking increases the risk of blood clots and decreases



Number of hip infections for elective hip replacement surgeries at Mather Hospital. 1/1/10-11/12/14 the amount of oxygen delivered to the incision, which slows healing, so quit or at least cut back as much as possible. If you are carrying extra weight, recognize that it puts an additional strain on your body and can make recovery that much more difficult. Consult with your physician for smoking cessation and nutritional information.

5. Are you really ready?

You have the biggest impact on the success of your recovery. Make sure you

are fully committed to exercising, eating right and being compliant with your doctor's instructions. Before you leave for the hospital, ensure that your house is ready for your return and that you won't have to climb stairs unnecessarily or worry about tripping hazards like small rugs. The better prepared you are for surgery and recovery, the better the outcome will be.



I am very proud to announce that the Bariatric Program at Mather Hospital is celebrating 10 years of success this November! We have improved the health and lives of thousands of people in our community through the efforts of my staff, the Mather Hospital staff and referring physicians.


Let me share some of the program milestones and achievements with you:

- As of October 4, 2014, I have completed about 3,000 cases at Mather Hospital.
- For the past year, the sleeve gastrectomy procedure has been performed more than any other bariatric procedure at Mather. This procedure enables rapid weight loss with fewer complications than the more conventional weight loss surgeries without the need for intestinal bypass.
- In 2011, I became the first surgeon in Suffolk County to perform robotic bariatric surgery using the da Vinci robot[®]. I have completed 224 robotic bariatric surgery cases to date with a 0% complication rate for leaks, bleeds, infections or return to the OR within 30 days.
- Because patients have successfully undergone bariatric surgery, they have experienced vast improvements to their health including having their diabetes resolved and eliminating hypertension, sleep apnea and joint pain. Our staff has helped them live healthier, more active lives through continuing support and counseling.
- Over the past seven years the Bariatric Program at Mather has achieved Center of Excellence designation from Surgical Review Corporation and the American Society for Metabolic and Bariatric Surgery.

I congratulate everyone involved with the Bariatric Center of Excellence and, of course, all of our patients who had the courage and determination to take back their lives.





Mather Hospital Receives Sixth Consecutive Top "A" Rating for Hospital Safety

Mather Hospital has received The Leapfrog Group's top "A" Hospital Safety Score for the sixth consecutive ratings period. Mather is one of only 204 hospitals in the nation and one of only two on Long Island to have achieved an "A" grade in all rating periods since The Leapfrog Group started reporting in 2012.

The Hospital Safety Score rates how well hospitals protect patients from errors, injuries and infections. It is compiled under the guidance of the nation's leading experts on patient safety and is administered by The Leapfrog Group, an independent industry watchdog focused on initiative breakthrough improvements

in the safety, quality and affordability of healthcare for Americans. Calculated under the



guidance of Leapfrog's Blue Ribbon Expert Panel, the Hospital Safety Score uses 28 measures of publicly available hospital safety data to produce a single "A," "B," "C," "D," or "F" score representing a hospital's overall capacity to keep patients safe from preventable harm. More than 2,500 U.S. general hospitals were assigned scores in fall 2014, with about 31 percent receiving an "A" grade. \tilde{e}

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
Building on Excellence: Hospital Building Project Takes on Challenges to Healthcare


